4. COMPLETING AND SUBMITTING A PROPOSAL

4.1. Your Proposal must consist of the following three documents:

- Signed Declaration of Undertaking (see Attachment 2)
- Technical Proposal (see Section 4.4 below)
- Financial Proposal (see Section 4.5 below)

Proposals must be prepared in English.

4.2. Your Proposal must be submitted by email to the IUCN Contact (see Section 2). The subject heading of the email shall be [RfP Reference – bidder name]. The bidder name is the name of the company/organisation on whose behalf you are submitting the proposal, or your own surname if you are bidding as a self-employed consultant. Your proposal must be submitted in PDF format. You may submit multiple emails suitably annotated, e.g. Email 1 of 3, if attached files are too large to suit a single email transmission. You may not submit your Proposal by uploading it to a file-sharing tool.

IMPORTANT: Submitted documents must be password-protected so that they cannot be opened and read before the submission deadline. Please use the same password for all submitted documents. After the deadline has passed and within 12 hours, please send the password to the IUCN Contact. This will ensure a secure bid submission and opening process. Please DO NOT email the password before the deadline for Proposal submission.

4.3. *Eligibility*

Not applicable.

4.4. *Technical Proposal*

The technical proposal must address each of the criteria stated below explicitly and separately, quoting the relevant criteria reference number (left-hand column).

Proposals in any other format will significantly increase the time it takes to evaluate, and such Proposals may therefore be rejected at IUCN's discretion.

Where CVs are requested, these must be of the individuals who will carry out the work specified. The individuals you put forward may only be substituted with IUCN's approval.

4.5. *Financial Proposal*

4.5.1. The financial proposal must be a fixed and firm price for the provision of the goods/services stated in the RfP in their entirety.

4.5.2. *Prices include all costs*

Submitted rates and prices are deemed to include all costs, insurances, taxes (except VAT, see below), fees, expenses, liabilities, obligations, risk and other things necessary for the performance of the Terms of Reference or Specification of Requirements. IUCN will not accept charges beyond those clearly stated in the

Financial Proposal. This includes applicable withholding taxes and similar. It is your responsibility to determine whether such taxes apply to your organisation and to include them in your financial offer.

4.5.3. *Applicable Goods and Services Taxes*

Proposal rates and prices shall be exclusive of Value Added Tax.

4.5.4. *Currency of proposed rates and prices*

All rates and prices submitted by Proposers shall be in United States Dollar (USD)

4.6. Additional information not requested by IUCN should not be included in your Proposal and will not be considered in the evaluation.

4.7. Your proposal must remain valid and capable of acceptance by IUCN for a period of 90 calendar days following the submission deadline.

4.8. *Withdrawals and Changes*

You may freely withdraw or change your proposal at any time prior to the submission deadline by written notice to the IUCN Contact. However, to reduce the risk of fraud, no changes or withdrawals will be accepted after the submission deadline.

5. **EVALUATION OF PROPOSALS**

5.1. *Completeness*

IUCN will firstly check your proposal for completeness. Incomplete proposals will not be considered further.

5.2. *Technical Evaluation*

5.2.1. *Scoring Method*

Your proposal will be assigned a score from 0 to 10 for each of the technical evaluation criteria, such that '0' is low and '10' is high.

5.2.2. *Minimum Quality Thresholds*

Proposals that receive a score of '0' for any of the criteria will not be considered further.

5.2.3. *Technical Score*

Your score for each technical evaluation criterion will be multiplied with the respective relative weight (see Section 4.4) and these weighted scores added together to give your proposal's overall technical score.

5.3. *Financial Evaluation and Financial Scores*

The financial evaluation will be based upon the full total price you submit. Your financial proposal will receive a score calculated by dividing the lowest financial proposal that has

passed the minimum quality thresholds (see Section 5.2.2) by the total price of your financial proposal.

Thus, for example, if your financial proposal is for a total of CHF 100 and the lowest financial proposal is CHF 80, you will receive a financial score of $80/100 = 80\%$

5.4. *Total Score*

Your proposal's total score will be calculated as the weighted sum of your technical score and your financial score.

The relative weights will be:

Technical:	70%
Financial:	30%

Thus, for example, if your technical score is 83% and your financial score is 77%, you will receive a total score of $83 * 70\% + 77 * 30\% = 58.1\% + 23.1\% = 81.2\%$.

Subject to the requirements in Sections 4 and 7, IUCN will award the contract to the bidder whose proposal achieves the highest total score.

6. **EXPLANATION OF PROCUREMENT PROCEDURE**

- 6.1. IUCN is using the Invitation Procedure for this procurement. This means that only invited bidders may submit a proposal. IUCN typically invites from four to six bidders to submit a proposal.
- 6.2. You are welcome to ask questions or seek clarification regarding this procurement. Please email the IUCN Contact (see Section 2), taking note of the deadline for submission of questions in Section 3.1.
- 6.3. All proposals must be received by the submission deadline in Section 3.1 above. Late proposals will not be considered. All proposals received by the submission deadline will be evaluated by a team of two or more evaluators in accordance with the evaluation criteria stated in in this RfP. No other criteria will be used to evaluate proposals. The contract will be awarded to the bidder whose proposal received the highest Total Score. IUCN does, however, reserve the right to cancel the procurement and not award a contract at all.
- 6.4. IUCN will contact the bidder with the highest-scoring proposal to finalise the contract. We will contact unsuccessful bidders after the contract has been awarded and provide detailed feedback. The timetable in Section 3.1 gives an estimate of when we expect to have completed the contract award, but this date may change depending on how long the evaluation of proposals takes.

7. **CONDITIONS FOR PARTICIPATION IN THIS PROCUREMENT**

- 7.1. To participate in this procurement, you are required to submit a proposal, which fully complies with the instructions in this RfP and the Attachments.
 - 7.1.1. It is your responsibility to ensure that you have submitted a complete and fully compliant proposal.
 - 7.1.2. Any incomplete or incorrectly completed proposal submission may be deemed non-compliant, and as a result you may be unable to proceed further in the procurement process.
 - 7.1.3. IUCN will query any obvious clerical errors in your proposal and may, at IUCN's sole discretion, allow you to correct these, but only if doing so could not be perceived as giving you an unfair advantage.
- 7.2. To participate in this procurement, you must meet the following conditions:

- Free of conflicts of interest
- Registered on the relevant professional or trade register of the country in which you are established (or resident, if self-employed)
- In full compliance with your obligations relating to payment of social security contributions and of all applicable taxes
- Not been convicted of failing to comply with environmental regulatory requirements or other legal requirements relating to sustainability and environmental protection.
- Not bankrupt or being wound up.
- Never been guilty of an offence concerning your professional conduct.
- Not involved in fraud, corruption, a criminal organisation, money laundering, terrorism, or any other illegal activity.

7.3. You must complete and sign the Declaration of Undertaking (see Attachment 2)

7.4. If you are participating in this procurement as a member of a joint venture, or are using sub-contractors, submit a separate Declaration of Undertaking for each member of the joint venture and sub-contractor, and be clear in your proposal which parts of the goods/services are provided by each partner or sub-contractor.

7.5. Each bidder shall submit only one proposal, either individually or as a partner in a joint venture. In case of joint venture, one company shall not be allowed to participate in two different joint ventures in the same procurement nor shall a company be allowed to submit a proposal both on its behalf and as part of a joint venture for the same procurement. A bidder who submits or participates in more than one proposal (other than as a subcontractor or in cases of alternatives that have been permitted or requested) shall cause all the proposals with the bidder's participation to be disqualified.

7.6. By taking part in this procurement, you accept the conditions set out in this RfP, including the following:

- It is unacceptable to give or offer any gift or consideration to an employee or other representative of IUCN as a reward or inducement in relation to the awarding of a contract. Such action will give IUCN the right to exclude you from this and any future procurements, and to terminate any contract that may have been signed with you.
- Any attempt to obtain information from an employee or other representative of IUCN concerning another bidder will result in disqualification.
- Any price fixing or collusion with other bidders in relation to this procurement shall give IUCN the right to exclude you and any other involved bidder(s) from this and any future procurements and may constitute a criminal offence.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY AND DATA PROTECTION

8.1. IUCN follows the European Union's General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). The information you submit to IUCN as part of this procurement will be treated as confidential and shared only as required to evaluate your proposal in line with the procedure explained in this RfP, and for the maintenance of a clear audit trail. For audit purposes, IUCN is required to retain your proposal in its entirety for 10 years after the end of the resulting contract and make this available to internal and external auditors and donors as and when requested.

8.2. In the Declaration of Undertaking (Attachment 2) you need to give IUCN express permission to use the information you submit in this way, including personal data that forms part of your proposal. Where you include personal data of your employees (e.g. CVs) in your proposal, you need to have written permission from those individuals to share this information with IUCN, and for IUCN to use this information as indicated in 8.1. Without these permissions, IUCN will not be able to consider your proposal.

9. COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

If you have a complaint or concern regarding the propriety of how a competitive process is or has been executed, then please contact procurement@iucn.org. Such complaints or concerns will be treated as confidential and are not considered in breach of the above restrictions on communication (Section 2.1).

10. CONTRACT

The contract will be based on IUCN's template in Attachment 3, the terms of which are not negotiable. They may, however, be amended by IUCN to reflect requirements from the donor funding this procurement.

Background

The International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) is the world's leading conservation membership union established in 1948 and composed of over 1,400-member organizations of both government and civil society organizations with the input of more than 18,000 experts. IUCN's mission is to influence, encourage and assist societies to conserve the integrity and diversity of nature and ensure that any use of natural resources is equitable and ecologically sustainable. Through its Regional Office for West Asia (ROWA) and related global programmes, IUCN is seeking to strengthen its presence in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia on initiatives that align with IUCN's mission and priorities.

IUCN ROWA is currently implementing the AIUla Protected Area Network (APAN) project in AIUla, Medina Province (located in Northwest Saudi Arabia), in partnership with the Royal Commission for AIUla (RCU). The APAN project is aiming to establish and initiate a well-connected, fairly governed, and effectively managed network of protected and conserved areas that adheres to international standards and best-practices, shares lessons, brings successful regional and global approaches, and demonstrates initial success in nature conservation, restoration, and sustainable use of ecosystems and natural resources for people and biodiversity. IUCN-ROWA has established a project management unit for this project which includes staff based in IUCN-ROWA (Jordan), and in KSA.

Through this partnership project, IUCN and RCU are addressing key threats affecting AIUla's landscape and strengthening the socio-economic and environmental benefits arising from sound protection and management of AIUla's protected areas. This project sees the world's international standards and practices implemented in AIUla's protected areas, with the professional assistance of IUCN's regional and international experts. AIUla's bid to present authentic tourism experiences will be grounded in a world-class system of protected areas. Hence, this project supports the governance and management of AIUla's biodiversity and protected areas in accordance with IUCN international standards and best practices. RCU has recently designated six new protected areas: Sharaan Nature Reserve as well as the Harrat Uwayrid, Harrat Alzabin, Wadi Nakhla, AlGhameel, and Harrat Khaybar.

Scope of Work and Objectives

Under the supervision of the Senior Project Coordinator / Protected Areas, World Heritage and Business Programme – AIUla (IUCN ROWA), and in coordination and consultation with the Royal Commission for AIUla (RCU), the consultant shall provide the following services:

- Contribute to and support the implementation of **4: Technology solutions for protected and conserved areas** for (AIUla PAN) Project, in coordination with the project coordinator and component leader.

The consultant shall ensure the delivery of the outputs and activities and shall refer to the activity description in the project document (version May 2022).

The consultant shall be responsible for the **following specific tasks** under the following relevant components:

Support the implementation of Component 4: Technology solutions for protected and conserved areas.

Supporting the delivery of Component 4: Technology solutions for protected and conserved areas.

Outcome: Appropriate technology solutions are identified, selected and developed to help improve decision support and management for protected areas in AIUla, including for remote sensing, monitoring, data management and analysis, and enhanced connectivity for staff and local community partners.

Under Output 4.1: The biodiversity information and reporting system (BIRS) developed by the Database Project is operational and managed to support AIUla's decision making and management of its biodiversity and protected areas.

Activity 4.1.1: Operate and feed the BIRS developed by the Database Project. Role: Support the development of structure of the RCU Database Project, define and procure database software needs (separate budget for software), define, or refine structure and protocols for species, habitat, PA and general under the supervision of the biodiversity team leader, and in collaboration with the RCU Database Project Manager. The BIRS development phase should aim to cover the following aspects:

- This activity will focus on the structure and elements of the geo-databases as part of the BIRS, taking an inter-disciplinary approach with user inputs from biology and nature conservation experts. The following general approach is usually followed in such projects, however, the consultant will contribute to the implementation phase and mainly defining the thematic geo-databases and their structure and collecting and entering biodiversity related georeferenced data. Other phases will be covered through RCU Nature's Database Project:
 - Implementation phase (mostly covered by the Database Project):
 - Define and procure the technology and software needs.
 - Develop data standards and geo-referencing rules for data entry.
 - Develop and implement data sharing/exchange agreements and protocols.
 - Develop, validate, and test the system.
 - Collect and enter the attribute and georeferenced data. IUCN will contribute through this project in this phase.
 - Management phase (mostly covered by the Data Base Project, and supported by the consultant):
 - Develop and implement clear procedures for data update and maintenance.
 - Administer biodiversity content by biology experts.
 - Ensure an adequate number of IM / IT personnel to technically support BIRS administration.
 - Develop the long-term monitoring programme (inputs from other components).

- Analyse entered data to support protected area management.
- AIUla protected areas biodiversity data will be stored in various thematic databases and will be maintained via separate applications / interfaces. Data will be displayed via web services to facilitate data exchange between different BIRS components and with various external global information systems. Thematic databases will be structured and populated, including:
 - AIUla species database: This database will include flora and fauna attributes such as: scientific and common name(s), description, occurrences, species distribution, species conservation status, threats, endemic status, and similar data. It will be taxonomically validated by experts and continuously updated, including georeferenced occurrences where possible. All available occurrences will be included, including field records, records gleaned from the literature and records obtained from local knowledge. Through the user needs analysis, further attributes to support species reintroductions assessment and reporting will be identified. The opportunity to link with wider citizen science databases will be explored, along with opportunities to promote local to national citizen science inputs.
 - AIUla habitat database: This database will contain a catalogue of habitat types relevant for the Saudi Arabia national habitat classification. It will include spatial data, both raster and vector, representing distribution areas of habitat types as well as various other raw spatial data related to field observations. Through the user needs analysis, further attributes to support habitat rehabilitation and carrying capacity assessments and reporting will be identified. This data base will be created by the GIS Database Project, but the consultant will contribute to updating this database through the work conducted in this project.
 - AIUla PA database: This database will include the borders of AIUla's protected areas with corresponding attribute data from the registry of protected areas. This data includes information about the IUCN category, designation date, area, border description, zoning, etc. IUCN will update this database based on the findings of Component 2.
 - General databases: These smaller-scale databases will provide information that accompanies the main databases, such as literature references, multimedia files, researchers, experts, and project catalogues, lists of georeferenced localities, inventory of monitoring initiatives, etc. The consultant will contribute to updating this database as needed.
- Metadata, information about the data, will be provided along with attribute and spatial data, and will contain the following information:
 - Data owner
 - Data accuracy
 - Extent
 - Data sources
 - Scale and resolution of the data
 - Lineage

Under Output 4.2: Field data collection tools and data collection techniques developed by the Database Project are implemented.

Activity 4.2.1: *Use data collection tools, methods and protocols developed by the Database Project to feed the BIRS. Role: Integrate a number of data collection apps / systems for conservation / wildlife management and prepare / implement a training module under the supervision of the biodiversity team leader, and in collaboration with the RCU Database Project Manager. The BIRS should aim to cover the following aspects:*

- The implementation of this activity assumes that the Database Project will develop and procure the field data collection tools for the BIRS. Through this activity, the variety of field data collection tools (hardware and software) will be identified and procured (by the Database Project). The consultant will use the data collection tools to feed in the BIRS with data on the field through the work done in this project.
- IUCN will integrate several data collection apps / systems specifically for conservation / wildlife management are commercially available, such as ESRI's ArcGIS Conservation Solution. However, other data collection tools like SMART (Spatial Monitoring and Reporting Tool) will be made available through other RCU projects.
- The consultant will provide the necessary training related to the specific conservation solutions.

Under Output 4.3: Key information products are designed and developed.

Activity 4.3.1: *Develop species checklists and listing procedures. Role: Establish a system to develop and maintain species checklists compatible with RCU Database Project, establish and structure working groups, identify data collection and uploading tools and protocols, develop data analysis methods with the support of and under the supervision of the biodiversity team leader, and the RCU Database Project Manager. The species checklist and listing procedures phase should aim to cover the following aspects:*

- AlUla County should have a full and complete inventory of all its natural assets. A common challenge in protecting and managing biodiversity involves locating and identifying the species and knowing their conservation status and threats.
- The RCU Nature team has begun this process with an inventory study of flora and fauna, which will provide a key input for this activity. The development of species lists will, in turn, be a key input to the species database in BIRS.
- The process to develop and maintain species checklists would entail the following steps and types of information, which will be tied to the species database.
 - Establish working groups (involving experts from government, NGO, academic, community) to lead the work, guided by a term of reference. Working groups may be established for groups of species as is suitable for AlUla needs (mammals, plants, birds, etc.).
 - Define the structure of the checklist and supporting database attributes.
 - Identify data collection and uploading tools and protocols (examine available tools such as eBird and iNaturalist approaches).
 - Gather historic and current occurrence records for all species (e.g., scientific, and common name, number of individuals observed, date and location of occurrence, observer(s), supporting photos, etc.).
 - Gather information about status of habitats and species ecology, threats, and current conservation measures.

- Analyze the results and assign status codes.
- Develop data analysis methods to produce meaningful thematic maps combining different datasets to identify biodiversity and threat hotspots.
- Develop data analysis methods to guide the protected area planning and produce information products, like environmental risk surfaces ERS, relative biodiversity indices RBI, hotspot maps and heat maps, zoning plans and designing buffer zones and corridors.
- Attributes in the database should include the following types of information:
 - Class, Order, Family, Genus, Species, Common names, Red List status, Red List population trend, local AIUla status, population, and trend.
 - Presence in AIUla and source of verification.
 - Status in AIUla, as determined by the expert working group.
- Other considerations for this activity include:
 - The approaches and data infrastructure can be up scaled for wider application. Integrated state and national approaches will add value to the assessments and inform integrated conservation actions.
 - In AIUla County, legislation or regulation may be required if the checklists or species conservation status is to be recognized legally.
 - Knowledge about the conservation status of species, and the conservation actions needed to be undertaken is necessary for reporting under international conventions (e.g., Convention on Biological Diversity, Bonn Convention) and EU directives (e.g., Birds and Habitats Directives). At the national and global level, the aim is to provide scientifically validated information to convey the urgency of conservation issues to the public and policy makers, and to guide national and global priorities for conservation action.

Deliverables

The consultant shall submit the following to IUCN-ROWA:

Component 4: Technology solutions for protected and conserved areas

Outcome: *Appropriate technology solutions are identified, selected, and developed to help improve decision support and management for protected areas in AIUla, including for remote sensing, monitoring, data management and analysis, and enhanced connectivity for staff and local community partners.*

Under Output 4.1: *The biodiversity information and reporting system (BIRS) developed by the Database Project is operational and managed to support AIUla's decision making and management of its biodiversity and protected areas.*

Activity 4.1.1: *Operate and feed the BIRS developed by the Database Project. (1 software procurement list, 1 proposal for an improved BIRS structure, mechanisms, and operation)*

Under Output 4.2: *Field data collection tools and data collection techniques developed by the Database Project are implemented.*

Activity 4.2.1: Use data collection tools, methods and protocols developed by the Database Project to feed the BIRS. (1 proposal for the integration of data collection apps / systems for conservation and wildlife management decision-making, 1 training module developed and implemented with BIRS users and stakeholders)

13.5 The Consultant shall cooperate fully in any investigations linked to events under this clause which may be carried out by IUCN and/or the Donor and shall give access to all records (and to its staff if applicable) in the event that this is needed to support investigations of complaints of unethical behavior, fraud or corruption. IUCN reserves the right to take necessary legal action and/or terminate the Agreement in accordance with clause 16 if it determines that any fraud, corruption and/or unethical behaviour has occurred. Any repayment claim may also include interest, investment income or any other financial gain obtained as a result of the fraud.

14. NON-DISCRIMINATION AND POLICY ON THE PROTECTION FROM SEXUAL EXPLOITATION, SEXUAL ABUSE, AND SEXUAL HARASSMENT (SEAH POLICY)

18.5 Either Party waives all and any rights of set-off against any payments due hereunder and agrees to pay all sums due hereunder regardless of any set-off or cross claim.

18.6 All provisions that logically ought to survive termination of this Agreement shall survive.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same agreement. The Parties agree that the signed counterparts may be delivered by e-mail in a ".pdf" format data file or electronic signature (e.g., DocuSign or similar electronic signature technology) and thereafter maintained in electronic form, and that in this case such

signature shall create a valid and binding obligation of the party executing with the same force and effect as if such ".pdf" or electronic signature page were an original thereof.

16.3.1 The performance of this Agreement by either Party is subject to acts of God, war, government regulations, epidemics, pandemics, disaster, strikes (excluding strikes of respective Parties' personnel), civil disorders, curtailment of transportation facilities, or other emergencies making it illegal or impossible for either Party to perform its obligations ("Force Majeure Event"). The Party subject to a Force Majeure Event shall promptly notify the other Party of the occurrence and particulars of such Force Majeure Event, including how it impacts the performance of its obligations under this Agreement. The Party so affected shall use diligent efforts to avoid or remove such causes of non or delayed performance as soon as is reasonably practicable.

16.3.2 This Agreement may be terminated unilaterally without compensation for any one or more of the foregoing reasons by written notice from one Party to the other.

16.3.3 Notwithstanding the above, the Parties may agree to a suspension or an extension of the Agreement as deemed appropriate. Upon termination of the Force Majeure Event, the performance of the suspended Services shall without delay recommence.

16.3.4 The Party subject to the Force Majeure Event shall not be liable to the other Party for any damages arising out of or relating to the suspension or termination of Services by reason of the occurrence of a Force Majeure Event, provided such Party complies with all the requirements under this clause 16.3.

16.4 Effects of Termination

In the event of termination under this clause, IUCN shall pay the Consultant any outstanding Remuneration in respect of Services performed by the Consultant up until the effective date of termination, it being understood that the total amount payable by IUCN to the Consultant shall not exceed the Remuneration stated in article 5 of the Agreement. The Consultant shall within thirty (30) days of termination, and at IUCN's request:

16.4.1 to the extent possible, complete the Services subject to the Remuneration made available until the date of termination and stop all ongoing activities;

16.4.2 refund to IUCN any advance payments received in excess of the total expenditure incurred as evidenced in the invoices submitted to IUCN,

16.4.3 reimburse IUCN for any expenditures made in breach of the terms of this Agreement; and

16.4.4 submit final technical and financial reports and any other materials, deliverables, works or other outputs created as at the date of termination under this Agreement.

32. APPLICABLE LAW AND DISPUTE RESOLUTION

17.1 The performance and interpretation of this Agreement will be subject exclusively to the laws of Switzerland, excluding its conflict of laws principles.

17.2 Any dispute arising out of or in relation with this Agreement that cannot be resolved amicably by the Parties or by way of mediation shall be submitted to the competent courts of Lausanne, Switzerland.

33. GENERAL PROVISIONS

18.1 This Agreement is the complete understanding between IUCN and the Consultant and replaces all other agreements and understandings in reference to the subject matter of this Agreement.

18.2 Any modification or amendment of this Agreement shall be in writing and shall become effective if and when signed by both Parties.

18.3 This Consultancy Agreement is non-exclusive. IUCN is free to consult other experts in the Consultant's field of specialization.

18.4 This Agreement is personal to IUCN and the Consultant, and neither Party may sell, assign or transfer any duties, rights or interests created under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other.

18.5 Either Party waives all and any rights of set-off against any payments due hereunder and agrees to pay all sums due hereunder regardless of any set-off or cross claim.

18.6 All provisions that logically ought to survive termination of this Agreement shall survive.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same Agreement. The Parties agree that the signed counterparts may be delivered by e-mail in a ".pdf" format data file or electronic signature (e.g., DocuSign or similar electronic signature technology) and thereafter maintained in electronic form, and that in this case such signature shall create a valid and binding obligation of the party executing with the same force and effect as if such ".pdf" or electronic signature page were an original thereof.
